FOLMC went through a transformation over the past year as we embraced a unified volunteer model. ONE FOLMC.

And while we've discussed our new structure, I also want to highlight another core component of the organization, which was adopted by our Board of Trustees in November, 2020.

FOLMC's **Racial Equity and Social Justice Plan** demonstrates our commitment to racial equity and social justice in Montgomery County.

Every aspect of our organization is involved to achieve the following:

- · Our Board and Staff reflect the diversity of the county.
- FOLMC fosters a culture of inclusion and mutual support to ensure that every person within our organization can thrive.
- Our programs and marketing efforts increase cross cultural understanding and civic responsibility.
- We recognize the power in providing free programming for the county and use this opportunity to spotlight voices from marginalized communities.
- And as a partner to MCPL, we advocate for budget and policy changes to expand library access and services for critical populations.

What Does Equity Mean From an Organizational Standpoint?

It's important to note that there's a difference between equity and equality. When things are equal, they are the same, but when things are equitable, they are fair. Equity comes from dismantling things that produce inequality. When applied internally, our organization

made changes to its operational structure to create a more just and welcoming environment for all.

For instance, not only do we want to fund programs that represent the entire community; we also want all different kinds of people to see themselves in the programs we produce, people we were not previously reaching but who are central to our mission.



- We reviewed our programming through a racial equity lens, creating a framework for the optimal times of day and days of the week to hold programs for our audiences.
- Our new volunteer model supports an array of different skill sets that maximizes impact.
- Our Board of Trustees comprises a variety of perspectives, experiences, ages, and cultures, which translates into effective guidance and decision-making. While a few of our Trustees will be cycling out as they reach their term limits, at one point as much as 20% of the Board has been an underrepresented demographic in library groups.

Inclusivity is a core purpose of MCPL's strategic plan, and as the Friends of the Library, we not only support that—we live it, too. We want everyone to feel like they can take part in supporting their library, regardless of their background and status, so that we can embody our mission to respond to the needs of all county residents and the ever-changing world we live in.

A Note from MCPL Director Anita Vassallo



Exciting things are happening at MCPL!

We wrapped up an enormously successful Summer Reading Challenge! (SRC) Kickoff at the Rockville Memorial Library on June 17. Approximately, 2,880 residents (children, teens and families) took pictures in the Monty the Service Dog photo booth, created crafts, participated in a scavenger hunt, met service dogs and rabbits, kept pace with the drumming of Kofi Dennis, enjoyed an engaging storytime, and more. Children who signed up to participate in the SRC were able to select a free book to take home. As of mid-July, over 11,500 children and teens have signed up to participate. We're expecting another very successful SRC program.

Service to teens is one of MCPL's four strategic goals for the next three years. MCPL's Teen Program Manager, Tyler Chadwell-English, is working to ensure there are welcoming spaces for teens in each branch and to enhance their library experiences. A part of this initiative is to provide a variety of gaming equipment to support teen gaming programs across the system. Gaming systems are planned to be open daily for use by teen customers to promote positive interactions at the branches and to be used for programs. These programs will promote collaboration, critical thinking, problem solving, discovery based learning, and healthy

competition. Tyler is now consulting with the Librarians for Teens and their supervisors about the appropriate teen space set up for each individual branch. He has identified the gaming equipment and will soon begin ordering the items. He is also reaching out to the Teen Advisory Boards for their input. Once everything is in place, Tyler and the other members of the Central Programming Team will begin pilots. Pairing these offerings with programs that encourage teen participation and collaboration will strengthen our relationship with teens and encourage lifelong library usership.

Residents and staff are so pleased to have the FOLMC Booksales back in many of the branches and looking forward to their return to all locations. The Booksales offer residents opportunities to help their local libraries and their communities through volunteering and donations.

The support of Friends of the Library, Montgomery County, through the branch Booksales and other avenues has allowed MCPL to enhance services and programming like these and many others. We are very appreciative of the support and look forward to sharing the progress and outcomes of these initiatives.

A Tremendous Gift

Drs. Helen & Stanley Segall

FOLMC thanks Hal Segall of Potomac MD, and Wynn Segall, of Bethesda MD, for their incredible donation of approximately 3,525 books, the majority of which are Russian 19th and 20th century literature in the Russian language.

The Russian books are from the estates of Dr. Helen Segall (1931-2018), Hal and Wynn's mother and a Professor of Russian Language and Literature who served as Chair of the Russian Department at Dickinson College. A portion of the collection, including books about science, history, and literature, belonged to Dr. Segall's husband, Dr. Stanley Segall (1930-2022), who chaired the Department of Nutrition and Food Sciences at Drexel University.

A survivor of the Holocaust, Dr. Helen Segall immigrated to the U.S. from a displaced persons camp in Germany on Thanksgiving Day 1949. Fluent in Polish and Russian, and conversant in German, Ukrainian, and English when she arrived in the U.S., Dr. Segall subsequently earned a B.S. in Library Science from Simmons College and a PhD. in Russian Language and Literature from Bryn Mawr College.

In addition to articles on Russian literature, Dr. Segall authored works on the Holocaust, which were published in the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum's Encyclopedia of Camps and Ghettos. One of the donated books, *Perestroika at the Crossroads*, contains an essay by Dr. Segall.

Hal and Wynn divided the collection between academia and FOLMC. "The majority have been donated to FOLMC because we learned that there is strong interest in Russian language books in the Russian émigré community in the DC area and beyond our region, and we wanted the books to go to people who would appreciate and value them," Hal said, "Our mother and father loved and collected books, and because my mother began her

career with

Sciences,
it seemed
fitting to support
the Montgomery
County Public Libraries on
behalf of both our parents."

Dr. Segall's life has inspired us tremendously, and FOLMC is grateful to Wynn, Hal, and their respective families for sharing her books with us so that we can find new readership for this incredible collection.
