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What Would a Day Without Libraries Look Like?

You might already think that libraries play an important role in your life, and you might even support them through donations or volunteerism, but in order to completely understand how libraries benefit our society, our culture, our education, and even our health, I want you to take a moment to imagine just what life would be like without them.

This exercise takes me back to when I was an undergrad at the University of Virginia and saw for the first time "A Day Without Art," which was a global campaign for AIDS awareness. It was more than a fundraiser; organizers would cover up all of the artwork, statues, and paintings around the Grounds in order to foster AIDS education and fight prejudice.

"What's the purpose of all this?" I first wondered, eyeing the paintings hidden behind a cloth in the student union. But as I walked around, I felt a shiver. Without art, the University didn't seem as welcoming; it certainly wasn't as beautiful. My day didn't feel the same. I started thinking about how many voices had been silenced by AIDS and how they'd never be able to add their contribution to this world. I truly felt the loss.

The organizers were on to something: Only when you take something away can you sense the depth of the void. When the COVID-19 pandemic shuttered the physical library building, for example, we saw how many people depend on libraries, not only for books but also for computers, for meetings, for a safe space as well as for a sense of community. Just like with art, libraries serve not only to enrich life as we know it—they also act as a necessity.

Now think for a moment what would happen if you were to take away everything FOLMC did for a day in the library:

- You wouldn't see the colorful ABC123 carpet in the Children's room
- You wouldn't have the puzzles, games, or the LEGOs for MCPL STEM programs
- There wouldn't be as extensive a LGBTQIA+ collection or programing to discover and experience
- You wouldn't have the breadth and variety of workforce development, expert-led programming
- There wouldn't be author events that reflect Montgomery County's diverse communities

 You wouldn't see the Mosaic Creative Writing Program anthologies of short stories, essays, and poetry by middle school student authors that let them feel proud of their culture and who they are.

Just imagine everything the library *wouldn't* have without FOLMC. It wouldn't have DVDs if we hadn't given MCPL the seed money back in the 1990s. It wouldn't have the option of the self-checkout machines we use today. It wouldn't have music.

Remember Storytimes back in the cassette tape era? The children's librarian could stop the cassette, talk for a bit, and then hit play again. When iPods first came out, we piloted them to cue the music, and now we're helping to introduce Soundtrack Your Brand, an App that lets MCPL stream 58 million licensed songs, during in-person and virtual Storytimes.

Speaking of technology, we provided funding for the Digital Media Lab at Long Branch and piloted SMART Rooms at Gaithersburg and Olney. During the COVID-19 pandemic, we funded the Zoom license that allowed MCPL to continue to host programming—in a virtual format.

Libraries help us stay relevant. Their collections change often to reflect our world. FOLMC has been there every step of the way for MCPL, funding everything from Hatha yoga classes to hands-on science demonstrations, performances by Grammynominated artists, knitting clubs, financial literacy groups, and swashbuckling animal puppet shows.

With FOLMC's help, there is *always* something new in the library, which gives visitors a reason to be excited, and to come back again soon.

Without FOLMC, the library simply wouldn't be the same. It would be less alive, less hopeful—it's a scenario we never, ever want to see happen. So, please help us do your part to ensure that MCPL will always have FOLMC around by joining or renewing your membership today.

A Note from MCPL Director Anita Vassallo



ontgomery County Public Libraries (MCPL), like most public and private entities worldwide, has faced many challenges since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. With the contribution of every single member of our dedicated staff, collaboration with our partners, and support from Friends of the Library, Montgomery County, MCPL continues to build back.

We were able to accomplish many great things in fiscal year 2022, which closed on June 30. Here are some of our highlights:

- Transitioned to Aspen Discovery, a brand-new library catalog providing customers with a new suite of features and a better online experience.
- Reopened two refreshed branches Germantown Library on October 16, 2021 and Maggie Nightingale (Poolesville) on May 21, 2022, and closed the Potomac Library on May 22, 2022, to begin its refresh.
- Began offering the Maryland Day by Day Family Literacy Activity Calendar, which provides daily educational activities for parents and caregivers to do with their children to get them ready to succeed in school.
- Installed outside tables and seating on the plaza of Long Branch Library, allowing for greater use of the area, including outdoor programming.
- Kicked off Library Lovers Month with a special program featuring Maynard Okereke, the Hip Hop M.D., who presented an ocean-themed virtual STEM program.

- In February 2022, expanded hours of service beyond prepandemic levels to include Sundays.
- On February 28, 2022, the last day of Black History Month, County Executive Marc Elrich signed an executive order that enabled the County to rename the Silver Spring Library to the Brigadier General Charles E. McGee Library.
- With assistance from the County's Innovation Office and input from community members, customers and staff, drafted MCPL's new 2023-2026 Strategic Plan.
- Summer Reading Challenge! began on June 15, 2022.
 This year's theme is "Oceans of Possibilities." An indooroutdoor kick-off event held on June 18 was attended by
 more than 2,500 people. In less than a week, almost 5,000
 children and teens signed up, and the numbers keep
 growing.
- MCPL ended FY22 with a bang setting a new record for circulation! With over 11.6 million items circulated, we surpassed our FY19 circulation numbers (FY19 was the first time MCPL had the highest circulation of all public library systems in Maryland).

I'm very proud to see how we have worked together, rebounded, and come back stronger from the obstacles of the past two and a half years.

What do you like about it?


