Long Branch Digital Media Lab

Check It Out features a program, event, or project that your membership gifts, donations, and book purchases funded for MCPL.

Have you ever wanted to make a video with a green screen, play with the latest graphic design software, or simply learn how to take a selfie? In May 2014, FOLMC provided partial funding for Studio i, the Digital Media Lab at Long Branch, a 21st-century creative space for teens and other library patrons. Use Studio i's handheld video camera to shoot a scene in the green screen room, edit video on the latest version of iMovie software, amp up the background with a soundtrack in Garage Band, and add visual effects with Adobe Photoshop or Illustrator on one of the iMac desktop computers. Studio i has the latest versions of Adobe Photoshop, InDesign, and Illustrator, as well as Apple's iMovie, Garage Band, and iPhoto, on several iMacs, Macbook Pro laptops, and iPad Air tablets.

Studio i is a safe space in the Long Branch area where teens can go after school to express themselves and build something creatively. FOLMC is dedicated to funding programs and spaces for kids and teens in libraries, and Studio i has been a remarkable success in the Long Branch community thanks to your donations and book purchases.

The submission deadline for the award is November 30, 2015.

The chapter demonstrated incredible dedication to its newly built and recently opened branch by raising more than \$250,000 for a new Early Literacy Center, Connection Corner, and Digital Innovation Lab. Past winners include United for Libraries President-Elect Susan Schmidt and Twinbrook Library volunteer Dave Scalzi.

New Initiatives at the Bookstores

Fall is a busy season at our bookstore, and we have some new initiatives and changes to announce. Our Rockville location is now issuing email alerts when fresh comics are shelved. This comes on the heels of our successful 4th of July comic book sidewalk sale during which we sold more than 2,000 comics. We appreciate the interest and response from the comic lovers in our community!

We have also made a change to the bookstore donation guidelines. As of July 20, we are no longer accepting audio cassette tapes for donation due to lack of sales. Goodwill Industries, including the storefront that neighbors the Rockville bookstore in the Randolph Hills Shopping Center, does still accept them.

Finally, we have ramped up our online offerings. We currently have more than 400 volumes for sale through the Amazon Marketplace, with more titles being added every week. From the Library Director

Parker Hamilton, MCPL Director

On September 24, County Executive Isiah Leggett will convene his second summit on the Library of the Future. The summit will provide an opportunity for energizing conversations with neighbors, County and State officials, and other stakeholders; and an occasion to celebrate visions and ideas for new and different perspectives about big questions as we plan and work together to ensure Montgomery County Public Libraries maintains its place in the forefront of library systems nationwide.

Recognizing the strength of having new and diverse voices at the table, Mr. Leggett has issued invitations to more than 1,000 individuals. Representing the many residential, ethnic, business and educational communities of Montgomery County, the participants will come together to engage in conversations that will help shape MCPL's strategic priorities and support the County Executive's policy initiatives which include: Responsive Service Delivery; Preparing Children to Learn and Live; and Ensuring Vital Living for All of Our Residents.

This day-long summit will provide an opportunity for Mr. Leggett and key library staff to learn what MCPL customers and County residents want from the public library and for residents to hear from an expert in the field, Susan Benton, president and CEO of the Urban Libraries Council. Participants will be able to engage in group discussions in person at the Silver Spring Civic Building (the hub for the summit); join virtually from Gaithersburg Library; or connect through social media using #MCPLFuture.

During the month of September leading up to the summit, MCPL will focus on gathering input from other residents through "man on the street" interviews and discussion sessions at Montgomery College, Montgomery County Public Schools and the Gilchrist Center. Customers visiting local branches can also provide feedback, and on September 22 residents can ask questions and share ideas through "Live Discussion with the County Executive," his regularly scheduled online chat.

I hope you will be able to join this important conversation and help us create the Library of the Future. Every voice matters!

Every year, FOLMC members work with the Montgomery County Library Board (MCLB) and Library Advisory Committees (LACs) to advocate for MCPL by testifying at public hearings, attending meetings with County officials, and ensuring that libraries receive the funding they need to provide essential services to County residents. 
