# **From the Library Director**

Parker Hamilton, MCPL Director

In the FOLMC 2014 winter newsletter, I wrote about the strategies MCPL has developed to foster our mission of "offering free and equal access to services and resources that connect the people of Montgomery County to ideas and information which sustain and enrich their lives." Guided by our vision to support,



encourage and inspire our customers, we have employed these tools to get to know the residents of Montgomery County by assessing their needs and interests.

During these assessments, we learned that many residents wish to have materials in their first languages for recreational and educational reading and to share their heritages with their children. Since 1986, when MCPL first began purchasing adult and children's books and periodicals in certain world languages, the makeup of the County's population has changed significantly, and-- it is now majority minority.

Over the years, MCPL has introduced materials in eight different languages: Amharic, Chinese, Farsi, French, Korean, Russian, Spanish, and Vietnamese. These languages represent the largest linguistic groups of new immigrants in the County as determined by data from the U.S. Census Bureau, American Community Survey, Maryland- National Capital Park and Planning Commission, and Montgomery County Public Schools.

Location of these world language collections and the addition of any new language collections are determined by a review of

- 1. the most current census demographic information;
- 2. the percentage of the speaker population in the community;
- 3. the level of participation in County English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) programs and related programs for immigrants; and
- 4. a pattern of expressed demand, including individual requests from groups, ESOL teachers, and programs, and branches.

# **Chapter Spotlights**

#### DAVIS

#### President: Robert Owen

The Davis chapter of Friends of the Library had another successful year in 2014, with about 130 dues-paying members, a dozen or so board and committee members, and many volunteers who work daily on our honor-system book sales. Led by Karen Braun and Helen Stern, our book sales force handles hundreds of books each month, sorting and categorizing, pricing, marketing, arranging topical displays, and monitoring regular sales from carts of special and more valuable books. We also have two large, special sales each year in December and June. These sales provide the chapter with a steady flow of funds with which to supplement the programs and facilities of the Davis Library.

Part of our mission is to provide our library branch with tools and furnishings that make the library a nicer place to visit. We have always provided our children's librarian with supplies for crafts and activities, supported the summer reading program, and paid for landscaping improvements implemented by the local gardeners' club.

Friends of the Library and its chapters primarily provide enhancements to MCPL, but sometimes a need arises that the Montgomery County government is unable to address. In the past year, the Davis chapter purchased a computer table with a "power dome" and two book display carrels for the library floor, a color copier and supplies for staff use, and a new soft chair for the children's reading area. Our biggest expenditure, however, was for the refurbishment of all of the library chairs at a cost of nearly \$16,000. Although they were in poor condition, there was no prospect of their replacement or repair without our help.

On the program side, Howard Braun leads a committee which arranges for eight to 10 library programs throughout the year (music, puppets, animals, science, magicians, speakers), especially for young people, and we are looking to improve our programs for seniors and teens. In addition, we hold a very popular annual Community Day in June with multiple programs and activities, and support an after-school reading program in a local school.

Davis is scheduled for a "refresh" in 2017, and we look forward to assisting in that effort. The Davis chapter's board and members meet monthly, usually on the third Monday at 7:00 p.m., and all are invited to join us.
