Introducing Dan Kelly, Wheaton Bookstore Manager

Dan discovered the Wheaton Bookstore shortly after moving to Glenmont in 2002 from southern Ontario, Canada. A used bookstore junkie since his teens, Dan was astounded by the variety of books and their prices. Over the years he found little gems — forgotten Penguin paperbacks, Norton anthologies, Brewer's Dictionaries — that opened paths of learning he still gains from.

Some of Dan's earliest memories are of the children's section of his local library. It's probably no different than anyone else's story — showing how prevalent and necessary libraries are — except that he swears, as does his sister, that R2-D2 visited when Dan was five years old. There's a possibility it might have been a trash can.

Regardless, his memory of the library shines that brightly, and Dan hopes the work FOLMC does at the Old Silver Spring Library location and, soon, the new Wheaton Bookstore helps the county make memories that will last as long. Dan also looks forward to, "keeping a place for forgotten books, those odd out-of-print editions, and collections people put care into making. A used book has life in it equal to its care. If the care of the bookstore adds to the life of MCPL, that's a success."


Chapter Spotlight

Friends of the Library, Potomac Chapter is one of FOLMCs' earliest Chapters, with an exceptionally popular monthly booksale which supports numerous exciting programs and collaborations. Booksales occur on the second Saturday of each month, with proceeds from the sales underwrite many of the branch's programs, including annual celebrations of Chinese New Year, summer reading activities, and Great Decisions, a series of talks on crucial international issues.

The sales, organized by long-time chapter board member Judy Davis and dedicated volunteers, have proved so successful and popular that the *Potomac Almanac* recently spotlighted the monthly event in a cover article. Some of the programs these sales have enabled the Chapter to sponsor are:



A "virtual tour" of Glenstone Art Museum with a well-attended talk by the museum's Outreach Director. Reinforcing the community tie, the museum gave the library a multivolume set of catalogs and books of and by artists whose works are displayed at the museum. The books are available in the library's reference area for perusal in the library. Described by *The Washington Post* as "what may be the country's greatest private collection of American and European contemporary art," Glenstone encompasses

two large exhibition buildings and more than 230 acres of landscape art and outdoor sculptures.

Potomac Day, featuring a parade, children's activities and retail/community organizations outreach. Each year the chapter provides a storybook character, most

recently Paddington Bear, who proves to be popular among adults and children alike, as well as with Potomac Library Branch Manager Lunden Gillespie. On March 30 at 10:30 am the library will celebrate Paddington's birthday with a movie and kids' activities.

Also upcoming: Harriet Tubman will visit the library March 23 at 11 am. The Underground Railroad conductor, portrayed by master storyteller Janice Curtis Greene, will tell tales of tragedy and triumph in a program for all ages.

Student Representatives to the Board of Trustees gain valuable insight and experience related to areas of nonprofit organizations, nonprofit boards and governance, leadership, and community involvement. While not a voting member of the Board of Trustees, the student representative will impact how FOLMC determines programs and enhancements with particular focus for how to best serve the teen population in Montgomery County.
