The Helping Hands Behind Our Libraries

Did you know that steel magnate Andrew Carnegie is behind many of our modern libraries?

Born dirt poor in Scotland, his family emigrated to Pennsylvania, where the ambitious teenager worked multiple jobs in a textile mill and at a telegraph office. There he was introduced to a small private library that a wealthy local, Colonel James Anderson, opened to employees every Saturday.

It made a lasting impression. Juggling jobs by day and studying at night, Carnegie believed that anyone could become successful so long as they worked hard enough. A library was the best possible gift for a community, he later said, because it gave people the opportunity to improve themselves.

After building, amassing a fortune and then selling Carnegie Steel, Carnegie devoted the rest of his life to philanthropy. Between 1893 and 1919, he provided more than \$1.3 billion (in today's dollars) in funding to construct over 1,600 libraries around the country. His grants were accompanied by design templates showcasing libraries as community centers which provided services for women and children unheard-of at the time.

Wisely enough, the titan of industry also required that towns applying for his grants provide a business plan for their library's annual funding, thus ensuring its sustainability.

In sharing the story of Andrew Carnegie, we at FOLMC hope to inspire others to do good. And just like we do when we bring people together through our programs and events, we hope to inspire others to do even more, because philanthropy is a critical component in keeping our libraries alive.


Our Library After Dark Gala is more than a fundraiser; it is an opportunity to shine a light on the different kinds of support that makes the library what it is today. The capstone of our Gala is the presentation of the Gilchrist Award, now over 20 years old, which was created by the FOLMC Board of Trustees in recognition of exceptional philanthropic service to Montgomery County Public Libraries in the spirit of former County Executive Charles W. Gilchrist.

It is a remarkable legacy. We recognize all of the volunteers and donors whose tireless efforts support our Montgomery County Public Libraries, such as:

- Jan Jablonski, who helped raise hundreds of thousands of dollars to make the Noyes Library an accessible early childhood literary center, and
- Rita Lewi, an advocate for the Chinese American community who created the first Asian film discussion group at Quince Orchard Library and hosted librarians from Taiwan.

Public libraries were built on the shoulders of volunteers and philanthropists—and they continue to provide critical support. So come to our Library After Dark Gala to learn about the wonderful people making contributions to our community, and how you too can get involved! Just as Andrew Carnegie believed in libraries as a place to improve your life and build a brighter future, so it is our mission to sustain them.

Why did you decide to join FOLMC?

Back in 2016, I was walking home from work and noticed a sign that read "FOLMC Bookstore coming." This was the Old Silver Spring location on Colesville Road, so I went online and wrote Lance an email introducing myself as a potential book clerk, because I am interested in children's books and had experience working in a bookstore in college and handled the children's section. I've always loved children's books—in fact, my library growing up was the old Silver Spring Library!

What is your hometown, professional background, and where did you go to school?

I grew up a few blocks from the old Silver Spring Library, and I still live in the same house. My "day job" is as a medical editor for a company that supports clinical trials and global health, and I also work one weekday evening and Saturdays at the FOLMC Wheaton Bookstore.

What do you like about the new Wheaton Bookstore?

I love that it's such a social space. The Wheaton Library is down the hall, and there are basketball courts and a playground right outside our windows. The children's section is well lit, more compact, and easier to manage.



I try to read every night and on weekends—often two or three books at the same time literary fiction, a children's novel, and sometimes a memoir.

What are you currently reading? Favorite book?

I just finished rereading *Little Women* along with *March* by Geraldine Brooks, which told us about the March family from the father's point of view after he "joins" the Civil War. It was interesting rereading the 1868 version of *Little Women* as an adult because you can pick up more of Louisa May Alcott's personality and what life was like for an intelligent woman living in the United States in the 19th century.

What are your other hobbies?

I volunteer as a dog handler at adoption events for a rescue alliance in DC. Like books, I can never get enough of dogs and have a German Shepherd mix and two Chihuahua mixes living with me and my family at home.

What do you enjoy most out of working with FOLMC?

It's a sweet feeling to hand a book to a child who's looking for a specific title and see her eyes light up.



From the Library Director

Anita Vassallo, MCPL Director



In early January, MCPL exited the Maryland's Digital eLibrary Consortium for Overdrive in which it participated for collective ebook/eaudiobook purchasing and lending. The decision to do so was made after much research and thought regarding what was most beneficial for the residents of Montgomery County. MCPL will now independently manage its own Overdrive ebook collection, which gives us significant advantages.

Our customers will no longer have to wait behind residents of other counties on holds lists, and they will soon see a collection more tailored to their needs and interests. We are able to be more responsive to customer recommendations for material to add to our ebook/eaudiobook collection. Customers can submit purchase suggestions via the platform that will now come directly to MCPL.

Another advantage is being able to set some of our own policies, such as determining the number of checkouts and holds allowed. We have already increased that number, which was six under the consortium, to ten.

When we began this process, we committed to fulfilling all our customers' holds that were existing prior to exiting the Consortium, and we have kept that commitment. If our existing customers have bookmarked the Consortium's website or set up the Libby app on their phone, Overdrive will reroute their accounts to MCPL's new Overdrive site.

We are so excited that our customers will now have shorter wait times for materials, and we will be able to curate a collection that reflects our community.

Friends of the Library, Quince Orchard Chapter (FOLQOC) raises money to enhance programs and patron experience at the Quince Orchard Library.

The Chapter's fundraising efforts have enabled the library to purchase printers, furniture, books, foam blocks for use in children's programming, and summer reading t-shirts for branch staff. FOLQOC also pays for upkeep of the plants in its popular Friends' Garden.

In the past year, the Chapter has sponsored events such as African Folktales, Teen Tech Week, the UTSAV annual Indian community festival, Bright Star Children's Theatre, the annual Chinese New Year celebration, and more.



Join the Chapter for its upcoming events, including:

- A seed planting program in the Friends' Garden, now in its fourth year, which will take place on Saturday, April 25.
- Biennial Quarry Earth Day at Aggregate Industries in Rockville on Saturday, May 2. Aggregate Industries is a major supporter of Quince Orchard Library, raising more than \$60,000 over the past 20 years, and its manager, Richard Freedman, won the 2018 Gilchrist Award for his support of FOLQOC and the library. There will be children's activities and more.

In addition, you can support the Chapter through its ongoing booksale inside the library—it takes place every day when the library is open, or by purchasing and inscribing your name on a memorial brick which is planted in the Friends' Garden outside the library.
