MCPL began the new year offering many exciting programs, services, and events to spark new ideas, foster connections, and expand knowledge.


We were thrilled to team up again with the Washington Wizards to promote youth reading and literacy through the "Wizard Winter Reading Challenge," which kicked off on January 3 and ends on March 20. This free challenge is a fun way to inspire children, teens, and their families to enjoy reading, visit their local library, connect with their community, and find different ways to be physically active this winter. Those who complete the challenge are eligible for a variety of prizes that will be available at their local library while supplies last. They also will be entered into a raffle for a chance to win two tickets to the Wizards' home game on Friday, April 12.

An exciting Contemporary Conversations series is being planned beginning with poet, writer, curator, and organizer Mahogany L. Browne in celebration of Black History Month. Browne is the author of recent works: *Chlorine Sky, Woke: A Young Poets Call to Justice, Woke Baby,* and *Black Girl Magic.* The series will also include speakers in celebration of Asian American and Pacific Islander, Caribbean Heritage, Hispanic Heritage, and Native American Heritage months.

Our branch Teen Advisory Boards (TAB) are busy helping their local libraries and the community by implementing, promoting, and advocating for youth services in the county. TAB is a group of library teen volunteers who provide feedback on programs, assist librarians with planning and running events, and advocating for libraries. Applicants for TAB must be 13 or in 8th grade at time of application, up to 17 or 18, and a senior in high school.

We continue to offer free vital resources for workforce, financial, and business development. Upcoming events include: help finding childcare and financial assistance to help with childcare; YouthBuild, a community-based pre-apprenticeship program for youth ages 16-24, to assist in connecting teens and young adults to jobs and training; LinkedIn Boot Camp for 45+ job seekers; how to pay for college and trade school; digital skills workshops; staff from the Disabled Veterans Outreach Program will be available to discuss services and assistance available to veterans; learn what Montgomery College has to offer - degrees, certificates, and financial aid; and a webinar to determine whether starting a business is right for you and whether you're ready for it.
