Feinstein's 1986 book, A Season on the Brink, chronicles a year in

the life of Bob Knight and the Indiana University basketball team; the book was later made into a film that aired on ESPN in 2002. Feinstein also writes a series of young adult sports mystery novels.

men and women who live in her world. Putney's new Lost Lords novel, *Not Always a Saint*, will be released in September 2015.

Each year, FOLMC provides hundreds of thousands of dollars to MCPL to meet the needs of library staff and patrons so that Montgomery County continues to have a world-class library system.

Games and education are a winning combination for kids. We are proud to fund innovative Early Literacy computer stations that provide a safe, fun learning environment for school-age children without connecting to the wider internet. These computers, called AWE Stations, have been designed to appeal to kids with touch screens, colorful keyboards, and literally millions of hours of different educational apps built in.

Plus, most of the stations your gifts have purchased have bilingual Spanish apps, including interactive ebooks, catchy musical games, and expeditions through Dora the Explorer's house. Art applications allow children to express their creativity, history apps take them on a journey through the past, and puzzle games build basic logic skills. AWE Stations are available at all branches except Kensington Park, Noyes, and Potomac. Silver Spring will have stations when the new branch opens on June 20, 2015.

As you can see, your membership gifts, donations, and bookstore purchases provide more than the programs that FOLMC puts on - you give free educational opportunities to children and families in your community.

From the Library Director

Parker Hamilton, MCPL Director



As MCPL prepares to close out fiscal year 2015 on June 30, I want to share with you the many exciting happenings through the year, and most especially, thank you for your continued support.

Our Summer Reading program was very successful – over 12,500 children and teens registered and read more than 80,000 books!

In September, you helped us promote National Library Card Sign-up Month by submitting a photo or video telling us what great services you use your library card for. During that month, MCPL registered 7,539 new card holders.

I convened MCPL's first Collection Summit on September 30. The purpose of this day-long, in-house summit was to examine policies and procedures for acquisition, delivery, and merchandising the collection, and to answer the question, "Are we giving our customers the materials they want when they want them?"

As of October 5, 16 branches now have expanded hours, joining the five branches whose hours were increased in FY13. In addition, four more branches are open on Sundays, bringing the total number of branches with Sunday hours to 13. These additional library hours and the \$50K for new materials came with an increase in library staffing to support the increased hours and collection. Approximately 39 merit positions and additional substitute staff have been added.

In November, MCPL was able to provide assistance to many residents by participating in the County's Employee Giving Campaign and its Community Service Day.

In January, we managed our unprecedented outage and began exploring ways to support our Integrated Library System network while preparing a contract to move to a cloud-supported system.

On February 18, MCPL, with the Library Board, Friends of the Library, and the Library Advisory Committees, celebrated the fifth annual Library Snapshot Day. This year, 17,157 people visited our branches; 37,693 items were checked out or renewed; 44,833 items were returned; 1,459 people used our public computers; 779 attended one of the 64 programs; and staff answered 11,462 questions.

In preparation for the opening of the new Silver Spring Library, the library building located on Colesville Road was closed to the public on March 15 in a ceremony commemorating 58 years of library service.
