A Message from Ari Z. Brooks, Executive Director



I miss the library. I really miss the library. I miss it because it's a staple in my family's life – it's how we get our books, how we get homework help, how we learn, and how we play. It's more than my job; it's my mainstay. I miss the parents with their kids who can't wait to push the button to open the automatic doors and run to the

children's section. I miss the retired businessmen in their button-down shirts reading *The Wall Street Journal*.

I know other people miss it just as much, if not more, than I do—the people I see every day from the Rockville men's shelter getting online to stay in touch with people through library computers. The women and children from the family shelter seeking social resources. The businessperson having daily conference calls in the meeting room. The folks timidly walking in to discover the building for the first time, and the others who boldly come in, saying, "I am here

"I miss walking thru the stacks and having a book (cover) choose me!" – RM for my conversation class; I am learning to speak English." Not to mention all of our volunteers, because libraries for older people are a vital part of their social well-being and an important way for them to connect.

People count on libraries not just for books but for *things* they can check out—in some neighboring systems they can check out measuring cups, shovels and power tools. In MCPL's Library of Music, they can even choose bongos, tabla drums, and guitars. I'm sure people are missing the ability to be able to simply explore. People miss our bookstores and the way they could spend a few hours browsing the aisles and leave with an armful of treasures.









Fundraising Success

Thanks to your help, in March, we quickly met—and then exceeded—our COVID-19 relief fundraising goal of \$10,000. In total, we raised \$14,487,76.

These funds provide emergency relief to FOLMC so we can shift to a new, virtual environment including:

- Purchasing multi-channel inventory software so that our bookstore inventory is accessible online and can facilitate online purchases.
- Continuing to pay salaries throughout the closure, so that no employee loses their job.
- Training our staff on new software and equipment to meet new needs as they develop.
- Obtaining equipment to create virtual interactive programming, such as video cameras, microphones, and lighting equipment.


But amidst the Coronavirus crisis, even without accessing the building, libraries are coming to us virtually by providing resources, knowledge, enlightenment, and entertainment. Our physical branches may be closed, but MCPL Branches are offering a wealth of completely free digital content.

All you need is a library card. If you don't already have one, you can sign up for a Digital Library Card: mcpl.link/DigitalCard.

When you visit www.montgomerycountymd.gov/library/, you have access to:

- Millions of E/Audiobooks, streaming services, learning platforms and research tools available 24/7 in the cloud library.
- Interactive video classes on an array of subjects, including Arts & Crafts, Music Lessons, and Wellness Programs, to name a few.
- Educational resources, for both students and teachers, through programs like Explora.



How is this programming even possible? We funded a Zoom license for MCPL, which uses it to host these programs. When doing their research they discovered that other video platforms did not provide the level of interaction that is needed in libraries. Most importantly, they also don't give people the level of privacy that libraries will always protect.

MCPL has always embraced technology—and FOLMC has been there to help fund it. From our GoKits with Samsung Galaxy Tablets with apps for young readers, to our Early Literacy Computer Stations, to the MCPL's Digital Media Lab, we've been ahead of the curve to make libraries digitally accessible. The need is greater now than ever before, and we're proud to be coming up with creative ways to serve county residents.



A Note from Anita Vassallo, MCPL Director

Our buildings are closed, but the libraries are very much open for business. We are still here to provide information, recreation and education to our community, and we've taken significant steps to increase that service in the face of this health crisis.

Our New Reality

It's a sobering wake-up call. History has proven, from the Great Depression all the way through the Financial Crisis of 2008-2009, that during times of recession, library usage has increased. That's because patrons seek out libraries in response to economic pressures as they look for resources to cope with job loss, home foreclosure, and worse.

As the Coronavirus crisis stretches from weeks into months, unemployment is skyrocketing and government aid is exhausted almost as soon as it's offered, it's inevitable that we are entering an economic downturn. Our libraries must be among the front lines of response to this new reality, as people seek out free job resources, interview support, and digital skills training.

Libraries will help the community recover from this trauma, and they will play an important role in bringing us back together. Library resources keep us healthy, safe, and informed with ideas for sleeping, meditating, staying calm, entertaining children, and providing a trusted source of information.

The role that libraries—and librarians—will play as responders to this new reality must not be understated. The community is going to need us, and that's why FOLMC's mission to support libraries remains critical.
