FOLMC is saddened to learn of the passing of Sheila Nathanson Lockshin and Joginder Singh, both of whom were tireless library supporters and true heroes of MCPL. The outpouring of support has been truly touching and we are honored that they thought of FOLMC during this difficult time.

Sheila Lockshin, a devoted mother and educator, was born in Cleveland, Ohio on December 30, 1941 to Ethel and Fred Nathanson. The family matriarch and beloved 3rd grade teacher at the Landon School for 20 years, Sheila touched the lives of many. Her role as an educator did not stop once she retired. She was committed to passing on her legacy to each member of her family. Nothing made her happier than spending time with her 10 grandchildren. She appreciated the simple things in life: A good book, tasty recipe, tidy house, grammar rules, and anything purple.

Joginder Singh was a devoted Sikh, son, husband, father, grandfather, and great-grandfather, amongst countless other roles. Born September 10, 1925 in Lahore (now Pakistan), his love for libraries started at the Central Institute of Education in Delhi. Singh worked for the American Library, New Delhi, for 32 years—the last 10 as the library's Director.

Singh remained active through his retirement, volunteering as the Library Consultant at the Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration in Mussoorie, India. He also compiled and edited the Fourth Edition of the Indian Library Directory which was published by the Indian Library Association. After immigrating to the United States in the mid-1980s, Singh was appointed to the Montgomery County Library Board and the Germantown Library Advisory Committee, serving as Chair to both.

Singh was recognized as an "Outstanding Volunteer" by the Maryland Library Association and was named a "Library Hero" by FOLMC in recognition of his support to MCPL. Singh continued serving on the Gaithersburg Library Advisory Committee until 2022.

A Note from MCPL Director Anita Vassallo

I am pleased to share the progress Libraries has made towards some of the actions of our FY23-FY26 Strategic Plan. The action items fall under our four goals:

- · Children 5 and under are ready for kindergarten.
- Teens are ready for college and/or the workforce, and to be lifelong users of the library.
- Speakers of languages other than English can participate fully in American society.
- Residents with limited access to technology and/or the internet can navigate a digital world to get what they need.

In February, Tyler Chadwell-English joined MCPL as our Teen Program Manager. Tyler served as a teen librarian in the Frederick County (MD) Library System. His vision is to bring County teens programming that benefits and excites them; to provide services that help them navigate career and educational opportunities; and to create welcoming spaces in our libraries that will foster lifelong library customers. Tyler has begun to design, implement and evaluate services for teens across MCPL.

Successful implementation of part one of our Hatchlings pilot was completed in March. The well-attended *Hatchlings: Ready to Hatch* programs received very positive feedback from customers. Hatchlings is a Maryland State Library sponsored program that helps expectant and new parents build the skills needed to be their child's first teachers. Songs and activities are used to help expectant parents learn about their baby's brain and body

development and how to set their child up for success by encouraging reading from the start.

MCPL purchased Welcoming Library kits created by I'm Your Neighbor Books, a nonprofit striving to facilitate engagement with children's books that represent New Arrival and New American communities. A Welcoming Library is a curated 30-book, all-ages picture book collection that depicts global, modern migration and the generations that build their lives in a new home. Each book contains a unique set of discussion questions written by I'm Your Neighbor Books and their cultural advisors. The kits, funded by FOLMC, will rotate throughout the system.

Our Summer Reading Challenge! is scheduled to begin on June 17. The 2023 theme is "All Together Now." MCPL and FOLMC are teaming up with several local non-profit organizations to help children and teens spread kindness to local animals, people, and the planet. When participants read and earn e-badges, they will help Montgomery County Animal Services and Adoption Center and Friends of Montgomery County Animals find forever homes for their adoptable pets; assist Manna Food Center with feeding families throughout the community, and enable Montgomery Parks Foundation to install 450 solar panels, providing green energy to power local parks.

We greatly appreciate the generous support of FOLMC as we continue work on the strategic goals and our mission of providing equitable access to information, ideas, and experiences that spark imagination and expand possibilities for all.
