We are excited about the opportunities these changes will bring as we continue to evolve to meet the needs of our public library system. It is our firm belief that embracing change is essential to our ability to move forward in a new environment and to successfully achieve our mission.

Check It Out: STEM Programs

Curious about where your contributions to FOLMC go? In this issue, we're highlighting some of the Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) and STEM plus art and design (STEAM) programs we cosponsor for school-aged library patrons.

As part of MCPL's All Children Excel (ACE) initiative, related activities provide opportunities for conversation, exploration, and interaction to introduce new words and information to our younger patrons. The specific goal of STEM education is to develop higher level skills to help

youth excel in educational and vocational settings, with particular focus on critical thinking, creativity, and innovation.

FOLMC and our chapters fund and cosponsor many related efforts, including Go! Kits, the Silver Spring branch Early Literacy Center, and various engaging programs. To bridge the gap between Summer Reading and the start of the school year, we've sponsored programs such as:

- Hands-on STEM Fun, with science-based crafts;
- · Mini-Makers, Science-Takers, offering projects like Pizza Box Solar Oven;
- Build the Future: LEGO Open Session, an opportunity for self-directed building with peers;
- Science Spectacular, featuring a "wild and wacky" scientist performing experiments; and
- Reptiles Alive, a show involving reptiles from all over the world.

The popular programs offer children a chance to fight summer learning attrition, hands-on education, and social engagement. Thank you for supporting the ACE efforts for our community!

On June 30, 2015, MCPL closed out an extremely busy fiscal year (FY15). We were able to accomplish many goals of our FY13-FY16 Strategic Plan. Our FY15 accomplishments included:

- Expanded access to the STEM learning Go! Kits that can now be borrowed at 11 library branches.*
- Added Early Literacy Computer stations with best-in-class learning software at all branches.^{*}
- Opened new, state-of-the-art Silver Spring Library, which has the County's first Early Literacy Center.**
- Developed self-guided STEM learning stations in all library branches.
- Introduced a new Readers' Advisory service, Beanstack, to connect children and caregivers with book recommendations.*
- Began offering Tumblebooks, a new e-storybook collection.
- Kicked off the Library Refurbishment and 21st Century Library Enhancements refresh cycle at Twinbrook Library.
- Increased branch hours at 16 locations.
- Opened KID Museum location at Davis Library.*
- Provided space for groups like Richard Montgomery High School's Robotics Club, that have used our spaces to build award-winning robots.
- Hosted more than 4,000 hours of meeting room use by 440 groups.



- Worked with MCPS to get library cards into the hands of all 800 students at Gaithersburg Elementary School.
- Expanded our e-magazine collection by introducing Flipster, an e-magazine resource.
- Upgraded our Catalog and Account services to a robust cloud-based system.
- Added NoveList Select, a readers' advisory database, to help customers find read-alikes.
- Created or expanded Vietnamese collections at Gaithersburg and Silver Spring Libraries and Amharic collections at Gaithersburg, Silver Spring, and White Oak Libraries.
- Provided 66,048 hours of English Language instruction through our partners at the Gilchrist Center.
