# B. Parker Hamilton Library Professional Award Presented at 4th Annual Library After Dark

The FOLMC Board of Trustees is pleased to announce that the Library Professional of the Year Award has been named in honor of former library director, Parker Hamilton, who retired earlier this year.

Hamilton worked for Montgomery County for almost 37 years and served as MCPL director for 12 years. County Executive Leggett describes her as a "remarkable woman." Hamilton began her working life in South Carolina as a domestic worker, telephone operator, and pawn shop clerk but ended it running one of the most innovative and progressive public library systems in the U.S. She earned her BA and MLS from the University of Illinois, Urbana-Champaign. "Director Hamilton's story is a testament to the power of access to knowledge and education," said FOLMC Executive Director Ari Brooks.

The B. Parker Hamilton Award will be presented at the annual Library After Dark Gala on

Saturday, April 14, 2018 at the Rockville Memorial Library. This year we will celebrate the theme of *Stories from the Stacks*. Libraries tell the stories of our community, offering a broad range of free services to all children and families; a place where we can learn, gather, and create new stories together.


MCPL is very excited to announce our second annual comic convention.

This is an action-packed, fun-filled event for the entire family. We're all fired up!


# **Big Read Coming to Montgomery County**

FOLMC is a lead partner organization with MCPL formed to put on numerous events and book discussions centered on the debut novel of Ethiopian author Dinaw Mengestu, *The Beautiful Things That Heaven Bears*. This award-winning book captures immigrant life and will be used as a way to promote discussions relevant to the Montgomery County immigrant experience. Friends of the Library, Silver Spring Chapter (FOLSS) is looking forward to a fantastic 2018. Our general meetings are open to current FOLSS members and interested members of the public. Leadership positions are open within the chapter.

In November, FOLSS participated in the ribbon-cutting ceremony for the second phase of the Silver Spring branch's Early Literacy Center (ELC), designed by Burgeron. Funding for both phases of the ELC was secured through extensive

fundraising by FOLSS. Additionally, representatives from our chapter worked with library staff and state officials to secure matching state funds, further developing the ELC.

The ribbon-cutting event featured numerous county and state officials, many of whom read to the children present, as well as, a range of STEM activities presented by library outreach staff. Also, in November, FOLSS provided funding for Breaker Space, construction of circuits and wiring taught by library staff in an afterschool setting, and a Learn to Spin workshop with Jennifer Lindsay, who taught participants to use a spindle and fiber to make beautiful yarn to take home.



In October, FOLSS funded music from Harp! Happy, who performed *Girls*, *Girls*, *Girls*, and a return visit from Sciencetellers, who presented Dragon Dreams, for grades K-5. The program used a story to teach about the changing states of matter, using bubbles, rockets, and dry ice. The chapter

also co-sponsored the *Alice's Ordinary People* Contemporary Conversation film screening in partnership with FOLMC and MCPL.

In September, FOLSS funded Raymi Andean musical performance, in conjunction with Hispanic Heritage Month, and held our annual meeting and board elections.
