From the Executive Director

Today I received a phone call from my mother who told me there was someone in her office who wanted to speak to me. To my surprise, the voice at the other end was Juliana Schoettler who served as the FOLMC student representative to the board 12 years ago. It was gratifying to hear that Juliana fondly remembered her experience and was grateful to have had the opportunity to benefit libraries at such a young age. While working with my mother on a project, they both realized they shared a connection to me. That same evening I received an email from Juliana describing her current use of libraries as a young professional and expressing her interest to help mentor our newly elected student representative Jamar Foster (see article on page 3).

Nonprofit board diversity is a key indicator of good governance helping organizations connect with and support a broad constituent base. It is important to consider our entire community, especially young people, when determining organizational leaders and stewards. Engaging youth as a part of the board process has many advantages including ensuring relevancy to this fast-growing population, promoting healthy relationships between young people and adults, and providing meaningful opportunities for service.

Over the past two decades, FOLMC student representatives have added great value to the organization through their service projects and their unique voice. For example, former representative Peggy Li worked with the Rockville branch staff to create a year-long advanced reading copies program. Juliana conducted a study group of teens that led to the creation of a position paper on library experiences among local teens. Erica Cafritz created a "Young Adult" version of our print newsletter that she distributed to local public and private high schools. And Jamar, who hosts a local MCPS television show, will be a great asset to reach young people through the media.

If you know a 10th grader that would like the opportunity to serve the library community, gain awareness and knowledge of board leadership, promote a positive image of youth, and develop new skills, please encourage him/her to apply for this unique position. Applications will be accepted online beginning in January at www.folmc.org/get-involved/student-representative. In addition to his studies, Jamar is involved in Seneca Valley's Student Government Association, track and field team, ROTC, and debate team. Jamar is also a certified studio technician at Montgomery Community Media and works for the Montgomery County Recreation department.

Jamar was born in Minneapolis and moved to Montgomery County when he was one year old. He has always been a dedicated reader, holding the record of most books read in a year at his elementary school. He enjoys reading biographies and history, and is particularly fascinated by the lives of public figures. In his free time, Jamar enjoys watching movies, especially documentaries.

Jamar learned about FOLMC through his work with MCPL's Teen Advisory Group. As student representative he wants to further develop how libraries involve teens in the community. He lives in Germantown with his family.

Spring Literary Event

On March 23 at 2 p.m., FOLMC will host a book launch with local author Tom Glenn. The event is free to attend and will be held at Asbury Methodist Village in the Rosborough Center Community Rooms. Asbury's scenic campus is home to a 17-acre nature preserve, and the entire 130-acre campus has been certified as a "Wildlife at Work" site by the Wildlife Habitat Council.

Mr. Glenn will discuss his newest novel *Last of the Annamese*, followed by Q&A and a book signing. Books will be available to purchase on-site and light refreshments will be provided. Mr. Glenn spent 13 years working on covert intelligence assignments shuttling between the U.S. and Vietnam. He speaks seven languages and has won numerous prizes for his short stories and novels. His writing draws on his experiences as an undercover agent as well as his time spent caring for hospice and AIDS patients, and the homeless. In *Last of the Annamese*, Mr. Glenn describes the haunting portrait of the lives of those trapped in Saigon in April 1975 as the city, and surrounding country, fell to North Vietnamese forces.



Staff Spotlight: Lysette House

Lysette House joined the FOLMC staff in June as our Membership and Database Coordinator. She interacts closely with chapter leaders and membership chairs and is a great resource for questions on chapter bylaws or membership renewals. Here's part of a conversation between FOLMC and Lysette.

FOLMC: Why did you decide to join the FOLMC team? LH: I am the secretary for Friends of the Library, Silver Spring Chapter. I was recruited when my husband and I kept buying several bags of books from the chapter's quarterly book sales. When I saw that there were positions open with the FOLMC administrative team, I thought it would be a great way to be more involved.

FOLMC: What is your hometown, background, where did you go to school?

LH: I'm from Vernon, New Jersey; I came down for college and never left. I have a B.A. in Political Science and M.S. in Justice, Law, and Society, both from American University, which is really just a lot of words to say I studied domestic and international human rights.

FOLMC: What do you like to read?

LH: I have a pretty eclectic taste.

I re-read Harry Potter usually once a year or more, but my bookshelves, ok, library--I had so many books we turned the guest room into a library--is full from John Grisham, Janet Evanovich, Stephen King, Clive Cussler, Agatha Christie, Lord of the Rings, and classics like Pride and Prejudice and Anna Karenina.

FOLMC: What are your other hobbies?

LH: I spend most of my free time at a local winery; the owners are friends and it's conveniently located near the Silver Spring Library, so I'm usually either doing something with the wine (bottling, labeling, crush/press, working festivals, etc.) or spending time with the owners' children. We make frequent trips to the library to read or play with the ELC [Early Literacy Center, funded by FOLSS].

FOLMC: What's a fun fact about you?


LH: I enjoy wine and Harry Potter. I'm also a 3-year cancer survivor. I volunteer some time with Lolly's Locks, a Bethesda-based organization providing real hair wigs to those who can't afford them. I was one of their first recipients.



The new programming space in the expanded Rockville Bookstore was the venue for our third annual live auction on September 10. A signed Andy Warhol book with original drawing garnered the highest bid of the afternoon. Thank you to all those who joined us. Preparation has already begun for the fourth auction scheduled for next June 2017.

Staff at the Rockville Bookstore recently discovered a First Modern Library Edition of The Great Gatsby in a second state dust jacket. Published in 1934 with a new introduction by Fitzgerald, only 5,000 copies were printed and the work sold poorly. The publishers kept the title in the catalog for five years before finally pulling it in 1939, at which time a second dust jacket was printed. These jackets were stamped "Discontinued Title" in red. Interestingly, despite being a

second state jacket, the copy found at the Rockville Bookstore does not bear the red stamp. This rare find sold for \$700 in partnership with the F. Scott Fitzgerald Festival (www. fscottfitzgeraldfestival.org).



Other recent finds include a first American edition of Amerika by Franz Kafka, published in 1940 and bearing its original orange salmon colored dust jacket; and an original correspondence between an American lawyer and Nazi architect Albert Speer discovered by Wheaton Bookstore staff inside a book. Stay tuned for more information about other unique treasures.

From the Library Director

Parker Hamilton, MCPL Director

As a result of a directive from County Executive Leggett during his second Library of the Future Summit, MCPL has increased its efforts in the areas of workforce and economic development. In May, MCPL's first Workforce and Business Development Coordinator began working on programming to better support and coordinate these efforts.

The initial project under this umbrella, Career Online High School (COHS), brought to libraries by Gale, a part of Cengage Learning, was launched in June. MCPL, the first library system in Maryland to launch COHS, began offering qualified community members the opportunity to earn an accredited high school diploma and a credentialed career certificate through this program.

Partnerships developed to bring free workshops to MCPL include:

- The Nuts and Bolts of Starting a Business, in partnership with the Maryland Small Business Development Center, for those interested in starting their first business, but needing more information on what to expect before beginning.
- A series of business workshops in Spanish, in partnership with the Latino Economic Development Center. The first two workshops focused on social media and websites for businesses.

- How to apply for jobs with Montgomery County Government, in collaboration with the County's Office of Human Resources (OHR). These workshops were the first ever by OHR targeting the public.
- A Job and Career Assistance for Skilled Immigrants
 workshop, in partnership with Upwardly Global, to
 address the challenges faced by many internationallytrained professionals residing in the County. The
 workshop offered resources available to help
 internationally educated and trained professionals to
 improve their job search skills in order to continue careers
 in their fields in the U.S.
- Federal Student Aid Application Assistance workshops, in collaboration with Montgomery College's Educational Opportunity Center, to give families hands on assistance in completing their FAFSA 2016-2017 and/or 2017-2018.

We will continue collaborating with businesses, organizations, and other County departments to deliver more of these targeted programs and to carry out the objectives in our FY2017-2020 Strategic Plan that will assist County residents in their pursuit of career and business development.

Check It Out



Congratulations to Library Director Parker Hamilton and MCPL, who recently received the Urban Libraries Council (ULC) Award for Organizational Change and Strategic Management as the 2016 Top Innovator Award. MCPL was bestowed this award for The Library Refresh Program: In-Time Solutions.

The Program presents a novel approach to renovate libraries by avoiding building demolition and long-term shutdown of facilities, and updating infrastructure and technologies towards creating 21st century libraries. The "refresh" methodology is fiscally responsible, dispersing community benefits of less "down time" and lower expense. These changes originate from the evolving role of public libraries, updates in technology, and ongoing customer expectations. The objective of the Program is to "return" an "improved" library to its community in a timely manner.

FOLMC funds MCPL membership in ULC, an organization of leading public libraries in North America. ULC articulates the strategic role public libraries serve for strengthening their community in economic and workforce development, learning and education, citizen and resident engagement, health and public safety.
