

## **OLNEY**

Attend a STEM program at the Olney library and you might see kids only a little beyond toddlerhood playing with a dozen brightly colored, plastic caterpillar toys. As they use them, the children are learning computer coding.

The caterpillars are among many "extras" from the Friends of the Library, Olney Chapter. The Chapter has paid for STEM and summer learning programs, purchased two oval, three-shelf display tables, and recognized the efforts of the 20-person staff of the Olney Branch.

The Chapter funds these activities through the used booksale at the rear of the library. Sale shelves hold a mix of classics, thrillers, romances, young adult novels, adult nonfiction, and always, stacks of children's picture books. "These, especially, fly off the shelves," says former chapter president, Mary Jane Heinbuch.

Since the booksale has been a fixture for at least a decade, little advertising is needed, beyond occasional notes at the check-out desk. A team of volunteers sorts the books and keeps the sale shelves stocked and tidy. Come summer, when readers muse, "I really shouldn't read library books on the beach," sales spike, says Chapter Board Member Joan Manny.
