Inspiring a Future Generation of Library Lovers

I first met Jamar Foster at an advocacy potluck at the Germantown Library that he attended with his mother. I immediately noticed his tall stature which made me ask his grade. He was a high school freshman, Jamar told me, and an avid lover of books—biographies, especially Oprah, Barack Obama, and the U.S. presidents.

Not long after our meeting, Jamar applied for the position of student representative on the FOLMC Board of Trustees and was overwhelmingly recommended. The position had a lasting effect.

I recently spoke to Jamar, who informed me that he is now living in Boston and attending Harvard University. "My experience with FOLMC started me on my path to Harvard," he said. "In interviews it was a great conversation starter. People were intrigued to know about my board experience as a young person."

FOLMC has encouraged the participation of young people on the board for more than 20 years. Student representatives act as an extra set of eyes and ears, providing advice on their library experience and how library services and programs can best meet their needs. This year's FOLMC student representative is Maraki Solomon. We are delighted to welcome her and know that she will make a significant mark on the organization in the coming years (no pressure, Maraki).

How can more young people get involved?

If we want to sustain libraries, we need to reach our youngest library constituents, not only to develop their interests but also to empower them to give back. We can do this by encouraging teens to take on leadership roles and seeking their input on library programming and the library's collections.

What are some other ways you can involve a teen in our library community?

- **Give a donation in honor of a teen in your life. As part of our community, they will receive a FOLMC membership card, the latest FOLMC news and events, and special discounts at our two used bookstores.
- **If you run a youth group in a church or synagogue, you could help organize a book drive, and donate them to our used bookstores. We've written before about Eagle Scout William T. Camut he collected several thousands of books and served as a role model for others to follow.
- **Bring your teen to a YA-focused program at the library like MoComCon, the MCPL Comic Convention, which takes place every January, or our own Vinyl Record Day Festival, which takes place in April.
- **Teachers or media center specialists could register your students to participate in our Mosaic Program, designed for middle school students. Its winners are published in an anthology which is added to MCPL collections.

Anita Vassallo, MCPL Director



"What a great example of books and art coming to life and of the talent and treasures we are so lucky to have here in our community," Councilmember Friedson said. Be sure to see it for yourself!

A New Name for Bethesda's Library

Many people remember it as the Bethesda Library, but the branch was renamed after former FOLMC Board Member, politician, and former U.S. ambassador Connie Morella in 2018. The library also underwent a refresh and now features new selfcheckout kiosks, new information and circulation desks, LED lighting, a brighter, lighter color scheme, and renovated bathrooms. Additional improvements were made to the building's infrastructure, including replacing the roof. The sidewalk and parking lot were also updated.
