Pivoting Progress

Remember when people said that computers were going to replace books?

Or when they said Little Free Libraries were a threat to libraries?

Skeptics will always find a reason to believe the sky is falling, but the truth is, they are underestimating how resilient libraries—and librarians—are. Libraries have always been at the forefront of embracing change, from digitizing collections and library catalogues to offering eBook downloads and Internet access. Pre-COVID, MCPL Cardholders could check out iPads, laptops and even Internet hotspots, which were funded by FOLMC.



That's why it came as no surprise that MCPL quickly adapted to the challenges presented by the global coronavirus outbreak by offering a wealth of completely free digital content and moving its in-person events online. As restrictions eased, MCPL reopened book drops and introduced contactless pickups for its book holds.

Similarly, FOLMC pivoted by transforming its *Mosaic* awards program for middle school writers and annual *Library After Dark Gala* into successful virtual formats. *Contemporary Conversations*, a series of talks about cultural and current issues with journalists and authors, became online events, and our *Vinyl Record Day* welcomed a New York singer-songwriter to judge our virtual talent competition.

Customers could still shop for FOLMC's used books and music online through our five online marketplaces, and we published weekly staff-curated reading lists on Bookshop.org. At a time of deep social and political division, we introduced FOLMC Book Bundles that spoke to timely events such as social justice and awareness and PRIDE month.

As soon as it was sanctioned by the county, we reopened our beloved Rockville Bookstore, implementing COVID-19 health and safety protocols, and resumed book donation acceptance. Customers could shop safely during our new business hours and select after-hours appointments. Our staff has been busy behind the scenes, working remotely, processing donations, and planning events for next year and beyond.

FOLMC to the Rescue

When FOLMC learned that the Barnes & Noble at Montrose Crossing was moving and its literary murals were not going with it, we sprang into action.

Remember the murals? They were on the second floor of the store, located above the escalators and next to the children's section—five-foot high mosaic tiled depictions of Edgar Allan Poe, Charlotte Bronte, Louisa May Alcott, and Mark Twain.

Director of Business Operations Lance Salins was instrumental in securing the works and, piece by piece, dismantling the 175-lb. treasures and carefully transporting them to a safe location.

Being library lovers, we couldn't help but do a little research. Who had made the murals? Was the artist still around? We learned that they were created by Alfredo Ratinoff, a mosaic artist who lived in Maryland at the time.

Mr. Ratinoff has served as artist-in-residence at Smithsonian and taught at the Holton-Arms school in Potomac. His many tiled artworks are featured prominently at locations like Strathmore Hall and the Watergate Gallery.

We contacted Mr. Ratinoff to find out if he would be interested in talking to us about them.

"Thank you for rescuing the murals," he said. "I'm happy they have found a home with you."

Mr. Ratinoff has agreed to tell their story as part of our 2021 Library After Dark Virtual Gala, where we will auction them off in order to raise funds to support MCPL. It's one more example of how our work at FOLMC serves to preserve our sense of history and the stories all around us.
