Love is in the air this February, not only for Valentine's Day, but also for library lovers around the world. To celebrate our love for libraries—and to show just how essential libraries are to our community—FOLMC will host a family-friendly Library Lovers Month Kickoff with *Finding Rhythm* on Saturday, February 3 from 11:00 AM – 12:00 PM at the Marilyn J. Praisner (Burtonsville) Library.

In this interactive experience, the Neuroscientist (Dr. Jessica), Father Rhythm (Dante' Pope), and Sister Song (Rochelle Rice) will share their music and teachings, and help children to find their rhythm and grow their brains. This event is geared toward elementary-age students.

Finding Rhythm teaches children how rhythm shapes them, helps them find the source of their individual power—and connects them with their community, through music and dance.

Finding Rhythm was created by a neuroscientist, Dr. Jessica Phillips-Silver, to teach children about the biological origins of human music



and the special power of rhythm to empower individuals and heal communities. Dante' Pope is a touring musician, educator-advocate,

and the musical arranger and producer for Finding Rhythm.
Rochelle Rice is an award-winning jazz, soul, and folk vocalist, as well as the host of Tell Her This podcast

A few lessons from Chuck Brown on 'staying power'

I hope you'll join us at our Library Lovers Month Kickoff event featuring *Finding Rhythm*'s Go-Go beats—did you know that Go-Go music began right here in Washington, DC?

Go-Go is a lively mix of syncopated rhythms with an emphasis on percussion. In fact, that's where the name "Go-Go" comes from: As one song ends, the drumbeats continue immediately into the next song, and so the music just "goes and goes."

The late Go-Go legend Chuck Brown, known as "the Godfather of Go-Go music," was a singer and jazz guitarist whose band, the Soul Searchers, was credited with helping to originate Go-Go in the 1970s. His songs were about suffering but also resilience, all told in a way that spoke to the heart. Brown really embraced the evolution of his music retold by younger generations. He played well into his 70s; as a devoted fan of Go-Go, I grew up on this music and bebopped my head to the beat on the morning drives to school. Coincidentally, I even ran into him after a library meeting at the Starbucks in Chevy Chase. Always a showman, Brown was dressed in his signature, ostentatious style, yet was very friendly and approachable, living up to his legend.

I don't think anyone who was part of DC's underground scene in the '70s would think that Go-Go music would be around for more than 50 years, but just like Brown himself, Go-Go is a testament to staying power, because it's authentic, and it resonates.

FOLMC, too, has staying power—we're turning 42 in 2024! And just like Brown and the musical genre he created, FOLMC has continually evolved to stay in sync with our audiences. For example, we recently rolled out a new, streamlined membership model, known simply as the "Friend," which makes it easier than ever for you to give.

All you have to do now is give a gift; there's no need to pick "donor" or "member"— because, after all, we're all Friends of the Library.

We've also introduced a recurring giving option so that you can make monthly, quarterly, or annual donations, which will help to promote organizational sustainability.

When you have staying power, you have long-lasting value. You've


A Note from MCPL Director Anita Vassallo

Our 2023 Summer Reading Challenge! was a tremendous success with over 14,000 children and teens, ages 0-17, participating. This is an increase of more than 1,000 from the previous summer, and the highest enrollment there has been in the past eight years. Focusing on the 2023 theme, *All Together Now,* MCPL and FOLMC teamed up with Montgomery County Animal Services and Adoption Center, Friends of Montgomery County Animals, Manna Food Center, and Montgomery Parks Foundation to help children and teens spread kindness to local animals, people, and the planet. Participants embraced the challenge. As a result, pets found forever homes, 300 families were fed over 800 meals, and 460 solar panels will soon be powering local parks.

Great things are happening with our teens. Since February, the program offerings for teens have increased and the program attendance has steadily climbed. Eighteen branches are actively running Teen Advisory Board (TAB) programs along with our monthly virtual TAB. Teen services include:

 Gaming equipment - Establishing the library as a space where teens/tweens can experience community around video game play and engaging teens in the realm of workforce and careers by collaborating with Montgomery College e-sports teams and local video game content creating corporations.

- Training A monthly tutorial for all staff on teen initiatives. Teen Services staff meet monthly to discuss programming and ideas.
- Career and workforce Collaborating with other entities to help teens write resumes and providing financial literacy courses.
- Contemporary Conversations Local high schools have been offered the opportunity for students to have discussions with our renowned guest speakers.



With generous support from FOLMC and an award from the Maryland State Library through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, MCPL has purchased a van for mobile outreach. This vehicle will significantly enhance our service to the community, allowing MCPL to bring resources and services to underserved communities.
